Dear Citizen Scientist,

Our Christmas Bird Count will be on Saturday, December 17, 2022.

We really appreciate your participation in this nationwide endeavor. Audubon and other organizations use data collected in this longest-running wildlife census to assess the health of bird populations and to help guide conservation action. Please see the reverse of this letter for the reporting form.

Please follow these guidelines to make the count as accurate as possible.

- 1. Be sure feeders are within the count circle.
- 2. If two or more people are counting in the immediate area, compare your counts and report only the largest number of each species.
- 3. Birds coming to feeders should not be totaled for the day. Report only the highest number of individuals of any species seen at one time. For example, when watching a feeder over a period of time, if 11 American Goldfinches are seen all at once then leave, 5 more appear then leave, and 6 visit the feeder later, the number you should report is 11, not 22.
- 4. In some species (e.g., Northern Cardinal) males and females look different. Count the largest number of each sex. Thus if you see 4 male Cardinals at one time and later see 3 female Cardinals at one time, report 7 Cardinals.
- 5. Please keep track of and report the total time you spend watching your feeders. If you watch for two separate half-hour periods, report 1 hour.
- 6. Telephone your report to Marguerite Fries at 717-263-2934 by 7 PM on count day, Saturday, December 17. Notice that we are encouraging you to include the birds' typical late afternoon feeding time by extending the reporting time to 7:00 PM. ☺
- 7. If you happen to see an unusual species during count week (December 14-20) that you do not see on count day, call the compiler, Valerie Barnes at 717-352-4397.
- 8. Record details if you see a rare bird for our area in winter.

There will be no tally dinner this year.

Thanks again for your help. Have a great day watching your feeders! Remember to **telephone your report to**Marguerite Fries at 717-263-2934 by 7 PM on count day, Saturday, December 17.
